THE RAY C. BLISS INSTITUTE OF **APPLIED POLITICS** is a bipartisan institute established at The University of Akron to honor Ray C. Bliss' commitment to promoting civic learning and political participation. Bliss served as chairman of the Republican National Committee from 1965 to 1969. He is credited with breathing life back into the GOP after Barry Goldwater's presidential defeat in 1964, as well as for his role in strengthening bipartisanship and a two-party system. Bliss earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from The University of Akron in 1935 as well as an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree in 1968. He served on the UA Board of Trustees for nearly a decade and was chairman at the time of his death in 1981.



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
The 2024 election had some unusual features. It was also a classic referendum on the party in the White House.

The conditions of the country favored the party-out-of-power.


The most salient issues favored the party-out-of-power, although some favored the party-in-power.

The major party candidates had off-setting weaknesses.




# IMPACT OF CONDITIONS, ISSUES, AND CANDIDATES: HARRIS AND TRUMP VOTERS



### Rating the Condition of the Country: Harris and Trump Voters




#### **How Important Was Biden's Job Performance To Your Vote?**




## Voters Differ on Many Policy Issues But Are Not Always Fully Polarized



## Voters Had Highly Polarized Views on Threats to Democracy





# Looking toward the future

- Ohio Republicans gained from the conditions of the country. It is unclear if these conditions will persist—but if so, Republicans may face similar difficulties.
- Differences on many issues are likely to persist beyond 2024 in Ohio, creating an opportunity for competitive elections.
- Candidate quality still matters, and offsetting weaknesses of the major party candidates may not persist in the future.
- The major party coalitions are in flux. The Republicans have made an initial adjustment. Democrats now have an opportunity to respond.



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
