The foundation was founded in 1947 by Earl Armando Alvares Penteado, whose objective was to support, promote and develop the plastic and scenic arts, culture and teaching. It is now one of the most important and respected academic institutions in Brazil, with 12,000 students and 1,200 professors. The campus is located in Higienópolis, one of the most traditional districts of São Paulo, and houses seven faculties: Business Administration, Fine Arts, Communication, Engineering, Economics, Law and Technology, post-graduation courses and MBA.

**Fernanda Magnotta** is a doctoral candidate and has earned a master's degree from the PPGRI San Tiago Dantas (UNESP / UNICAMP / PUC-SP) in São Paulo, Brazil. She is a specialist in Globalization and Culture (FESP-SP) and has earned a bachelor's degree in International Relations (FAAP). Her main focuses of research are international affairs and the analysis of foreign policy, especially focused on the United States. Her fields of academic interest are traditions and political ideologies and U.S. decision-making.

She is currently a professor and coordinator of the International Relations course at FAAP. Magnotta is the author of the book *Ideas matter: American exceptionalism at the dawn of the superpower* (2016) and is also a researcher at the Center of International Studies and Analyzes (NEAI) of IPPRI / UNESP and at the Center for Foreign Policy Studies on the United States

(NEPEU) of PUC-SP. Recently, she was a Brazilian head delegate at the G-20 Youth Summit in China, observed the United States presidential elections in Ohio invited by the U.S. Consulate in São Paulo, was selected by the UCLA / Banco Santander W30 Program as one of the 30 leading women in academic management of 2017 and represented Brazil in the First Young Parliamentarians Forum of the BRICS countries in Russia.



**Carlos Gustavo Poggio Teixeira** has a doctorate in International Studies from Old Dominion University as a Fulbright grantee. He earned a master's in International Relations from the Programa San Tiago Dantas at Universidade Estadual Paulista in São Paulo. His thesis "The Neoconservative Thought in Foreign Policy in the United States" won the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Award from the U.S. embassy in Brazil. His most recent book, *Brazil, the United States, and the South American Subsystem: Regional Politics and the Absent Empire* (2012) was chosen by *Foreign Affairs Magazine* as one of the best international relations books of 2012.

He currently is professor of International Relations at FAAP and at the Pontifical Catholic University (PUC-SP) in São Paulo, where he teaches courses both at the graduate and undergraduate level.
