#### **REGULAR BUSINESS MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

Mr. Pogue called the meeting to order at 8:05 a.m., and the Board adjourned into executive session on a 7-0 vote for the stated purposes of—to meet with legal counsel concerning pending or imminent litigation involving the University, pursuant to Revised Code Section 121.22(G)(3), to consider the appointment, employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion, demotion, or compensation of a public employee or official, pursuant to 121.22(G)(1), to review matters involving collective bargaining pursuant to 121.22(G)(1), and to consider property matters pursuant to 121.22(G)(2) and 1.59(E)(E). The meeting returned to public session at 10:49 a.m. on a 7-0 vote after a recess that began at 10:40 a.m.

#### **REPORT OF THE CHAIR**

Mr. Pogue preceded his comments with an announcement that the meeting agenda would change in order to consider the five New Business items immediately following the report of the Student Trustees to accommodate special guests.

Mr. Pogue congratulated Dr. Scarborough on being honored recently with the Distinguished Alumni Award from The University of Texas. Mr. Pogue said that Dr. Scarborough had earned his MBA from UT and was among three alumni honored for their professional achievements, contributions to society and support of that institution. Mr. Pogue said that Dr. Scarborough would be making two significant local appearances while keeping a very intense schedule of budget preparations for the forthcoming fiscal year to begin July 1. First, on April 27, he would be the keynote speaker at the Greater Akron Speaks Out for Values breakfast hosted by Heart to Heart Communications at the John S. Knight Center. Then on May 15, he would speak at the Cleveland City Club luncheon.

Mr. Pogue praised the Black Male Summit that was held the previous week, noting the luncheon he attended had included 1,600 people from 24 states. He commended Vice President and Chief Diversity Officer Lee Gill on that successful event.

Mr. Pogue also acknowledged the Men's Indoor Track and Field team's success on winning its second-consecutive, and fourth overall, MAC championship,

Mr. Pogue said that the current environment for higher education, particularly public higher education, is extremely challenging, and the Board is very pleased that Dr. Scarborough and his team are finding ways to meet some of these challenges. The governor has been outspoken in calling on public universities in Ohio to offer innovative ways to continue to provide quality education at more affordable levels. The University of Akron will respond today with two initiatives. One of them will enable working registered nurses to complete their bachelor's degrees online, which should help many people. Second, pending approval of Chancellor Carey, starting this fall the University will offer several General Education core courses for tuition that is half that charged by the community colleges in this region. Mr. Pogue said that much time has been invested in ensuring that these affordable courses will be top quality and offered in a new and creative format. He said that the Board is thoroughly supportive of this effort, which Dr. Scarborough would describe in detail later, to advance the University's strategy as a great public university by providing students a highly valued and affordable undergraduate education leading to a degree.

#### **<u>REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT</u>** (See Appendix C.)

#### **REPORT OF THE STUDENT TRUSTEES**

Mr. Dowd reported on the Student Trustee search process. He said that, as of that week, the Selection Committee had selected its top-five candidates to report to the President for approval, and, similar to past years, there had been an impressive candidate pool from which to choose. The Selection Committee's top candidates represented students who expressed a high level of professional skills and possessed knowledge and experiences that would contribute to the diversity of perspectives on the Board. The top candidates were composed of graduate and undergraduate, traditional and non-traditional students with areas of study ranging from a double major in Corporate Finance and Economics to Psychology. Mr. Dowd expressed hope that the governor would make a speedy approval.

Mr. Hull reported on the proposed amendments to the Undergraduate Student Government (USG) Constitution. As a brief background, he said USG undergoes a constitutional review process every five years, and this was part of its five-year review process. He said the majority of the changes to the constitution were clerical, to update and reword language to match current USG division names, and to improve clarity and reduce wordiness. He then summarized proposed changes.

Mr. Hull concluded by noting the change in the approval process for new student organizations, which currently are approved by the USG Judicial Department. That responsibility will be moved to the Department of Student Life, which is better equipped to handle this process and, because new student organizations receive University funds, more appropriate.

Mr. Hull introduced student Symphonie D. Smith, and Mr. Dowd introduced student Melissa Boswell (see Appendix D). Ms. Smith and Ms. Boswell each offered remarks to the Board regarding their Akron experiences. They each received a commemorative clock from Trustees.

Mr. Pogue said that, as he indicated earlier, the Board would consider the five New Business items first, each requiring a separate vote. Committee reports of items on the consent agenda would follow. After hearing a listing of each agenda item by the various committee chairs, one vote would be held on the items listed on the consent agenda. The Board would vote on any items that were not on the consent agenda right after the matters were presented.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

• Revisions to the Constitution of Undergraduate Student Government (Tab 1)

Ms. Campbell Jackson introduced Rachel Bodenschatz, Vice President of Undergraduate Student Government (USG), who represented USG in support of this action.

USG conducted a review of its constitution (University Rule 3359-43-01) in fall 2014 as part of its five-year review as prescribed in Section (J)(1)(a). Proposed changes included the following:

The general membership program was removed from Section (B)(2), Membership Requirements.

Section (B)(5), Accountability, was added.

Section (C)(6), Budget and Goals, was revised to move the presentation of USG's finances to the senate from the third senate meeting of the year to no later than one month after the president receives the financial information.

Section (C)(7), University Recognition of Student Organizations, was revised to remove USG from the approval process and instead make USG responsible for outreach.

Legislation sent to the student body for a vote would require a majority vote of those students voting, instead of a two-thirds vote, for passage, Section (H)(3)(b).

The removal of a member of USG would require a three-fourths vote of all USG members voting, rather than a three-fourths vote of all senate members voting, Section (I)(3)(c).

Proposed amendments to the constitution in accordance with Section (J)(1) would require a majority vote of all USG members voting to continue the process, rather than a majority vote of all senate members voting, Section (J)(1)(c).

Proposed amendments to the constitution in accordance with Section (J)(2) would require a two-thirds vote of all USG members voting, instead of a two-thirds vote of senate members voting, Section (J)(2)(a)(i).

• Ratification of the Collective Bargaining Agreement Between The University of Akron and the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (I.A.T.S.E.) (Tab 2)

Celeste Cook summarized the tentative bargaining agreement with I.A.T.S.E. Local 48. The tentative agreement extends through September 30, 2017 and provides across-the-board wage increases the same as for other University non-bargaining, classified employees ("me-too" agreement) for the years 2015, 2016 and 2017. Those increases will become effective only if University classified, non-bargaining staff receive wage increases in those years.

• Negotiation and Execution of Patent License and Commercialization Agreements (Tab 5)

The Board was asked to consider a resolution authorizing the University administration to negotiate and execute agreement(s) for licensing and commercialization of patented intellectual property (IP), jointly developed by the University with another organization, that has the potential for future commercial applications, including the possible transfer to a third party, subject to review and approval by the Offices of Research Administration and Technology Transfer, the Office of General Counsel and the President. A third party has approached the University with a licensing and commercialization proposal for the IP, which includes certain benchmarks that, if met, would call for the transfer of the IP to a separate third party. University Rule 3359-2-05 requires the University's Board of Trustees to approve the transfer of University IP to a third party.

After discussing the matter, the Board authorized its officers to consider and act on the proposal. Subsequently on April 15, the officers approved the inclusion into a proposed patent license and commercialization agreement the concept of allowing the transfer of University intellectual property to a third party upon the successful accomplishment of specific benchmarks by that third party. When the benchmarks are met, which would trigger the transfer, the matter will be brought back to the Board for final approval.

#### **RESOLUTION 4-7-15** (See Appendix B.)

• College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering Quasi-endowment (Tab 3)

In June 2012, the University of Akron Research Foundation (UARF), with the agreement of the College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering (CPSPE), moved \$1.7 million from the CPSPE accounts at UARF to the University of Akron Foundation (UAF) to create a quasi-endowment (\$1.5 million) and to establish a spending account (\$225,000) to support a supplemental graduate-assistant-stipend program.

The quasi-endowment and spending account have since increased in value to approximately \$2.3 million by growth and additional transfers. Specifically, the proceeds resulted from curriculum development services, fees and indirect costs obligated for CPSPE, but temporarily maintained within UARF.

University administration determined that the \$2.3 million appropriately belongs under the control and governance of the University. Therefore, with the approval of the University

Foundation Executive Committee, the current balances that resided within UAF were moved into the University.

Board approval was requested to create a quasi-endowment within the University that would fulfill the intent for which these funds were designated when originally directed to UAF, to provide annual merit-based, supplemental stipends (up to 20 percent of college-level stipends) for selected students for up to four years. (For FY2015, for example, 20 percent equates to approximately \$5,000 per selected student.) Targeted supplemental stipends of these types and amounts are common at programs that challenge CPSPE in the competition for high-quality domestic and international graduate students. If approved, the operational details would be developed by the college and approved by the Associate Chief Financial Officer and appropriate others within the University administration.

During July 2014-February 2015, 17,442 gifts were received, as compared with 16,655 for the same period in the last fiscal year (an increase of 5 percent).

This undergraduate certificate, to be offered by the Department of Public Administration and Urban Studies, is an 18-credit-hour program. The certificate would provide documentation of classes taken to acquire specialized knowledge in this area beyond the completed major.

### New Certificate in Public Management from the Buchtel College of Arts and Sciences, proposal #14-9409

This undergraduate certificate, to be offered by the Department of Public Administration and Urban Studies, consists of 18 credit hours of coursework in the history, organization and management of government. The certificate would provide documentation of classes taken to acquire specialized knowledge in this area beyond the completed major.

# New Certificate in Non-Profit Management from the Buchtel College of Arts and Sciences, proposal #14-9410

This 18-credit-hour program, to be offered by the Department of Public Administration and Urban Studies, would offer coursework in the history, organization and management of non-profit organizations and allow students to concentrate electives in the areas of citizen participation, community organizing and local government. This certificate program would provide undergraduate education in critical thinking, management and policy evaluation—skills that are directly related to civic involvement. Students would gain knowledge and understanding of the environment and management of non-profit organizations and agencies and learn the theory, skills and environment of non-profit involvement in public-sector support, volunteer activities and career opportunities.

#### **Delete Master of Arts Program:**

# Master of Arts: Food Science offered by the College of Health Professions, School of Nutrition and Dietetics, proposal #14-11036

This program had not been operational for six years, and the curriculum was no longer offered. There was a lack of resources to prepare students adequately, and no students were currently enrolled.

#### **Delete Three Graduate Certificates:**

### Electronic Business, proposal #14-12257; Healthcare Management, proposal #14-12260; and Supply Chain Management, proposal #14-12270

All three certificates, offered by the College of Business Administration, Department of Management, had been created expecting demand; however, there was no student interest.

#### **Delete Two Bachelor of Arts Programs:**

#### Bachelor of Arts: Fashion Merchandising-Business/Retailing, proposal #14-11087

This was a "step-up" program, offered by the Buchtel College of Arts and Sciences, School of Family and Consumer Sciences, that was based on the student first completing an associate degree in Marketing and Sales Technology – Retailing from the College of Applied Science and Technology (CAST). The Retailing program in CAST was suspended last spring and was slated to be deleted, so this program that was linked to it should have been deleted as well.

#### Bachelor of Arts: Fashion Merchandising, proposal #14-11080

This general program was no longer offered by the Buchtel College of Arts and Sciences, School of Family and Consumer Sciences. Students must select one of three specialized Fashion Merchandising track options: Apparel, Fiber Arts, or Home Furnishings.

#### **Delete Three Minors of Study:**

### Clinical Nutrition, proposal #14-11038; Community Nutrition, proposal #14-11039; and Food Science, proposal #14-11207

These programs, offered by the College of Health Professions, School of Nutrition and Dietetics, had not been operational for six years, and the curriculum was no longer offered. There was a lack of resources to prepare students adequately, and no students were currently enrolled.

#### **<u>RESOLUTION 4-1-15</u>**: Revisions to University Rule 3359-43-01, Constitution

BE IT RESOLVED, that the recommendation presented on April 15, 2015, to revise Rule 3359-43-01 to implement various changes to the constitution of Undergraduate Student Government, identified as part of its five-year review, be approved.

**<u>RESOLUTION 4-2-15</u>**: Pertaining to the Approval of the 2014-2017 Collective Bargaining Agreement Between The University of Akron and I.A.T.S.E. Local 48

BE IT RESOLVED, that the tentative agreement for the 2014-2017 labor agreement, which provides for across-the-board wage increases in the same percentage as the pool that may be established for the non-bargaining unit classified employees effective July 1, 2015, July 1, 2016 and July 1, 2017 (me too agreement), as presented by The University of Akron's negotiating committee and containing all of the tentative agreements and memoranda of understanding reached between the respective negotiating committees of The University of Akron and I.A.T.S.E. Local 48, be and hereby is approved by the Board of Trustees of The University of Akron.

#### **<u>RESOLUTION 4-3-15</u>**: GenEd Core Pilot Program

WHEREAS, The University of Akron's Board of Trustees desires to meet Ohio Governor Kasich's calls for more affordable and flexible delivery options in higher education and to provide a highly valued undergraduate education that supports students' progress to degrees; and

WHEREAS, The University's administration has recommended adoption of a pilot project to offer a series of more than a dozen general-education core courses in a format that optimizes student learning and is working collaboratively with faculty to migrate existing campus courses into a blended learning, highly engaging format and to create new courses via the established process; and

WHEREAS, The pilot courses are vital academic starting points in the liberal arts, sciences and mathematics curricular pathways and will be offered in a blended-learning format that combines online, experiential and face-to-face learning opportunities and brings technology into the student experience in innovative and engaging ways, and each course will have components that provide evidence that students can think critically about the subject area and move on to succeed in more advanced courses; and

WHEREAS, The select focus and blended-learning format of the pilot offerings should result in both more effective learning and increased cost effectiveness that could be passed along to students, thus allowing greater access; and

WHEREAS, The administration has recommended that the tuition for the general-education core courses in the pilot program be priced at \$50 per student credit hour, which is well below the standard University charge; and

WHEREAS, §375.30.30 of Am. Sub. H.B. 119 of the 127<sup>th</sup> General Assembly requires any waiver of tuition for a student or class of student not otherwise permitted by law at a state-

assisted institution of higher education to be approved by the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents; Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED That the GenEd Core pilot program will be implemented starting with the fall 2015 academic term; and

#### **APPENDIX C: REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT**

I want to remind everyone that, beginning in September of last year, we began working with each of the colleges on their individual strategic plans. Over a period of seven months, we have had a marvelous process that begins with the leadership of the college but then engages every single faculty member in all faculty meetings to update, and in some cases create for the very first time, a strategic plan unique to each of our colleges. For all of our traditional academic colleges, we have completed that process except for the College of Engineering and the College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering. Those meetings are scheduled for this Friday, where the conversation continues, and I expect it will make more good progress. There are two colleges that have not yet begun the process. One is the Honors College and the other is the Graduate School, and that is because we anticipate the recruitment of new deans into those positions so we really did not want to begin until the new deans are in place. We have made tremendous progress, and what is most exciting to me is that the two initiatives that Mr. Pogue referred to today came out of those strategic planning conversations. This a case in which shared governance has been employed over a period of time, and in all of the colleges except one there were unanimous votes of support.

Both the GenEd Core new initiative and the RN-to-BSN nursing degree completion program are in a college's strategic plan. Let me talk just a little bit about that.

First of all, there has been a lot of talk about these courses being blended-learning courses, or hybrid courses. For those who are particularly interested in this topic, I would refer you to a book that was distributed by the Northeast Ohio Council on Higher Education (NOCHE), *Wired for Success, Real-World Solutions for Transforming Higher Education* by Susan C. Aldridge and Kathleen Harvatt.

Susan Aldridge is the president of Drexel University Online and gave a marvelous presentation at the NOCHE meeting recently. Her book is as straightforward about what hybrid learning is, what blended learning is, as anything that has been written. Even more impressive, it gives a number of examples of where this has transpired over a period of years, so this is not really something new. Although it does not have widespread adoption, it does have pilot projects that are proven to be extraordinarily successful, and she details a number of those in this book. For those who do not want to read the 200 pages, let me just read a few paragraphs out of the book that describe what we are hoping to achieve with these general education courses that would target not only our new students but also reach into the dual-enrollment population in some cases. She writes:

Essentially, hybrid courses move between campus and cyberspace, combining face-toface with technology-mediated instruction in innovative ways to enhance the learning experience, reduce the seat time, and allocate resources more efficiently. And although attempting to view this model as a temporal construct, a certain percentage of time spent in both environments, the authors believe that experienced faculty members, for example, at the University of Central Florida, have come to view this hybrid of blended learning as a fundamental change in the learning paradigm in that it shifts the focus from a teacherdirected to a learner-sensitive model, thus supporting students' greater control over and engagement in the overall progress.

For example, social media offers a unique opportunity to keep the conversation going until class meets again, while video conferencing enables students from any distance to virtually participate in a face-to-face interaction. It fosters increased interactivity across the board—that is student interactivity, student to instructor, student to content, and student to outside resources. Online tools like blogs and wikis, for example, often give voice to bright but shy students who might otherwise go unnoticed in person.

Video game consoles like XBox Connect can be set up in the classroom, giving students a chance to actively work through complex concepts as they are being explained. It also integrates a variety of learning assessment mechanisms, technologies such as adaptive learning software, and breaking new ground with respect to data-driven learning assessment that measures continuous progress to outcome. On the other hand, in-class presentations are an exceptional vehicle for evaluating the digital content mastery, so there still is a classroom component.

Although there are certainly many variations on the blended learning theme, the authors write that they have seen few basic models emerge over time. One popular approach is the so-called flipped classroom, which basically turns the traditional classroom on its head. Using this model, instructors supply technology-mediated content instructions, typically short broadcast lectures and other online materials. They put that online for students to digest at home, while devoting the class time to applied learning activities, for example, group projects, in-depth discussions, etc. Consequently, the instructor assumes the role of coach to identify trouble spots, clarify difficult concepts, and facilitate active learning.

Regardless of design, hybrid courses that are thoughtfully conceived and effectively taught produce learning outcomes comparable to or even better than the traditional face-to-face courses. In fact, a recent study from the non-profit think tank Ithaka S+R involving 605 students in six public universities found that those who completed the hybrid version of an introductory statistics course showed slightly better outcomes than those in the traditional face-to-face only course. At the University of Central Florida, where blended learning has been around since the mid-90s, faculty research has also demonstrated and proven performance among students in hybrid courses when compared to those in the traditional kind: better exam scores, higher quality projects, deeper engagement and more meaningful discussions.

They conclude, "There's no question that technology-enhanced learning holds tremendous potential for opening new student markets, keeping institutional costs down, and most importantly providing a measurably greater value on academic investment." That is our hope for this program. It is the reason why we hired Todd Rickel, with all of his tremendous experience in this area, who will lead the GenEd Core initiative. We are excited in terms of The University of Akron being a leader in providing this very affordable and very accessible program when students are most vulnerable and need to spend the most time on their studies. So many students, because of the cost of higher education, have to hold two and three part-time jobs that take them away from their studies.

In addition to being low cost, we believe this program will be very high quality and have the potential to improve student outcomes. As always, it will depend on the faculty, the quality of the curriculum and the experience, but also on the University's support of that faculty so we will collaborate with the faculty over the summer to prepare them and their curriculum for roll out in the fall.

The governor has made it very clear that organizations like Western Governors University that have been successful in other parts of the country in this type of pedagogy want entry into Ohio. The governor has said that Ohio's public universities have a certain period of time before he lets competitors into the state, unless we can prove that we can do here what Western Governors has been able to do in other jurisdictions.

Mr. Pogue also mentioned the RN-BSN nursing program with Academic Partners. We will work with them to reach working nurses who have two-year degrees. Hospitals need their nurses to attain four-year degrees in order to earn a certain important certification, and there is a limited period of time for these working nurses to progress from their associate degree to a bachelor's degree. The College of Health Professions and particularly the School of Nursing, to their credit, have voiced their willingness to partner with this outside group to reach working nurses with this very affordable program.

For both the GenEd Core and the RN-BSN degree-completion programs, we are asking the Board to lower the tuition to these very affordable prices. If the Board takes that action today, we will then ask permission from the Chancellor to lower the tuition. Once we secure that approval, we will work with the faculty to roll this out for the fall and thereby do something extraordinary, I think, for higher education in Ohio. Thank you to Todd Rickel for his leadership and thank you to our faculty for their willingness to take this on.

Let me also mention the fact that I was able to attend the Black Male Summit. I am very proud of our institution, proud of Lee Gill, and proud of everyone who works with Lee Gill. I did not know too many people before coming to The University of Akron, but I knew Lee Gill because of his reputation, and it is certainly well deserved.

Let me conclude my report with some highlights.

The John S. and James L. Knight Foundation has been generous to this University for a long time. They continue to be generous. I want to publicly thank them for the \$250,000 unrestricted grant to the University to help us with our new strategic initiatives. I understand that there has been another grant for \$125,000 to the E. J. Thomas Performing Arts Hall to encourage Akronarea young adults to attend arts events. Again, I thank the Knight Foundation for its ongoing support.

There were 90 students and advisors who participated in alternative spring break service work in Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina. They helped to maintain a hiking trail, do coastal cleanup and work with Habitat for Humanity. We are proud of our students' activities.

And then, of course, to our athletic teams:

- The swimming and diving and track and field teams won their MAC Championships;
- The rifle team won the Western Intercollegiate Rifle Conference Championship;
- The men's basketball team, despite some horrible injuries and changes to the planned personnel, won 21 regular-season games for the tenth-consecutive year;
- Our women's basketball team passed the 20-plus-win mark for the third-consecutive season, a first for this particular program;
- Shawn Barber, the record-setting pole vaulter, is a finalist for the Sullivan Award; and
- Sina King earned the MAC Women's Basketball Player of the Year.

Our athletes and coaches are doing an extraordinary job.

Mr. Pogue mentioned the speaking engagements that I have been asked to present, at the breakfast on April 27 and to the City Club on May 15.

Spring 2015 Commencement will take place May 8-10 and will include the first group of graduates from our baccalaureate Corrosion Engineering program. We expect more than 1,900 graduates and their families to join us for five ceremonies. Four distinguished guests will speak:

- Anthony (Tony) Alexander, Advisory Trustee and former CEO of FirstEnergy;
- Randolph Baxter, retired federal judge;
- Mario Garcia, retired Microsoft executive; and
- Phil Lloyd, chairman of our UA Foundation.

The School of Law Commencement will be on May 17.

Every day, good news is reflected in various emails that come across my desk about the quality of our academic programs; the outstanding teaching, research and engaged outreach of our faculty; involvement by our students; and dedication of our staff.

Thanks to University Communications, we learned that in a staff editorial the Akron Beacon Journal lauded the success of last week's Black Male Summit and recounted highlights of the event as well as local initiatives tied to the vision of the summit.

We learned through the Akron Legal News that a team of researchers led by UA Assistant Professor Ge "Christie" Zhang has received a grant from the National Institutes of Health to continue working on a patch to repair damaged heart tissue.

WAKR reported on a new removable adhesive developed at the University that has earned a National Science Foundation grant, which will help to move it toward the commercial market.

From Dean Krovi we learned that our Information Systems student team from the College of Business Administration excelled in a regional competition hosted by Ball State University, in which projects and cases are presented by the students to a team of six IT executives. They came in second in the project category and third overall out of 12 teams. Thanks to their faculty advisor, Professor Liping Liu, for that success.

We learned from Dean Haritos that 100 percent of the initial Corrosion Engineering class is employed upon graduation, clearly creating the intellectual capital for helping to solve an annual \$400-billion U.S.-wide issue.

These are just a few of the outstanding accomplishments reported yesterday, so you can only imagine the depth and the breadth of accomplishment reported about our faculty, students and staff for an entire academic year. This all comes about by a robust, persistent focus on the quality of our academic programs linked to the ongoing development of our faculty and staff to the benefit of our students. Because we take accountability to our students, ourselves and the state seriously, there is a continuous effort to improve.

You will see in the Office of Academic Affairs report information about the Retention and Completion Plan Workdays attended by the faculty, staff and students in March. The two-day event was led by Associate Vice President Stacey Moore, the Retention and Completion Steering Committee, and the University Council Student Engagement and Success Committee. On the first day, we focused on assuring that all of our offices and units understand their roles and responsibilities in executing the Retention and Completion Plan, filling in gaps in the plan, and focusing more attention on the issues of reducing and eventually eliminating the achievement gap.

The second day was the formal launch of the plan, headlined by Dr. Timothy Renick, vice president for enrollment and student success at Georgia State University. Dr. Renick highlighted the success that Georgia State University has had in student persistence and completion that further validates our objectives and strategies, and he provided additional ideas for our being more anticipatory of our students' needs.

Professor of Marketing Deborah Owens praised the group in an email afterward saying, "Great discussions yesterday ... I have to say it greatly exceeded my expectations."

That workday further highlighted the power that our UA analytic system will have in alerting us to situations and circumstances that suggest significant discussion is needed either about students' behaviors that link to their academic success, or suggestions for their consideration of alternative majors. We look forward to previewing this system of informatics with the Academic Issues & Student Success Committee at an upcoming meeting.

Speaking of assuring student success, you have heard about the vision and college strategic plans for significant experiential learning in the educational experience of our students. While we have more we can do to assure this is part of our institutional DNA, we have some programs that do just that. The president mentioned the alternative spring break. In February, the Division of Student Affairs hosted the tenth-annual Hearts for Humanity, and it raised funds to support the students on alternative spring break. Eighty-four students traveled to Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina. While some of our other students chose the beaches and sunshine in those states, these particular students chose an alternative spring break to help improve communities. They built hiking trails and painted and cleaned cabins; they removed invasive plants and created an oyster reef; and they sided a house and installed windows. Their tweets said, "This was definitely one of the best weeks of my life; I wouldn't trade this experience for anything. PPL (meaning people) make your experience no matter what you do. S/O (shout out) to alternative spring break Georgia for the awesome times and memories, friends for life!"

At our Student Success Summit last year, Vincent Tinto indicated that one important attribute of a campus with high retention and completion rates is learning communities. As you know, over the previous year we have featured faculty members from various colleges to call out their contributions to the success of The University of Akron. Beginning today and over the upcoming meetings, we hope to present faculty and students who are involved in various ways to enhance and advance student success and, thereby, the University's success. Today we feature learning communities. Ms. Fedearia Nicholson, assistant vice president for student success, will introduce our students and faculty members. ## Guide to Terminology Used in Personnel Reports

Term	Definition/Explanation
Adjunct Appointment	Appointment to a full-time or part-time position, normally without pay. Individuals in this category are affiliated with the University for a specific purpose usually involving academic research/teaching. Appointment provides the individual with access to University systems/services as determined by the department/college.
Appointment	New hire of an individual to an approved Faculty, Contract Professional or Staff position. The appointment can be full-time or part-time, temporary or regular.
Department/School Chair	Faculty member appointed to provide leadership to an academic department or school within a college. Department/School Chair appointments normally cover the entire academic year (12-month appointment). A Faculty member's salary will be converted from 9-month to 12-month status using an approved formula to reflect the additional time worked. A stipend (currently calculated as 1/11 <sup>th</sup> of the converted salary) is awarded for assuming the additional responsibilities of a Department/School Chair. 1/10 <sup>th</sup> of the stipend is converted to base each year that the individual serves as a Department/School Chair.
Discharge	Involuntary termination of appointment.
Job Audit/Reclassification	Under University Rule 3359-25-10 the University may initiate audits and reviews of positions and classifications within the approved University Classified (3359-25-06) and Unclassified (3359-25-07) classification plans. In addition, employees may submit a request to determine if their current position is appropriately classified. The employee submits a Position Description Audit Questionnaire (PDAQ) to their immediate supervisor to initiate the job audit process. The immediate supervisor and second level supervisor are required to review and approve the information submitted on the PDAQ. Once the PDAQ is approved, it is submitted to the Classification Unit in Talent Development & Human Resources. The Classification Unit will review the PDAQ and determine if the position is appropriately classified or not. If the Classification Unit determines that the position is not classification. The recommendation will be reviewed and approved by the employee's management up to and including the appropriate Vice President. The approved recommendation will then be submitted to the University's Board of Trustees for approval.

Leave Without Compensation	If an employee is unable to work due to a documented medical condition or for other approved reasons and they have exhausted all accrued sick leave, vacation leave and compensatory time that they are entitled to use, the employee may continue their approved absence from work without pay and will retain status as a University employee.
Market Increase	The Classification unit in Talent Development & Human Resources will, upon request from a dean or vice president, conduct a market evaluation of a position or positions to determine if the University is providing an appropriate level of compensation. If it is determined that the current level of compensation is below the established market, a recommendation will be made to adjust the current level of compensation.
Merit Increase	Increase in pay granted for meeting established performance criteria.
Non-Renewal	Separation of employment of a Contract Professional employee without cause in accordance with the requirements established in University Rule 3359-22-01. The University is required to provide notice in writing to the affected Contract Professional employee. If the individual has two years or less service with the University, they will receive three months' notice. If the individual has more than two years of service, six months' notice is required.
Offline Salary Adjustment	Increase in salary that occurs outside of annual salary review process. Recommendations for offline salary adjustments are submitted by the appropriate Vice President to Talent Development & Human Resources for review and approval. Offline salary adjustments are normally recommended when specific market (internal or external) or equity (internal) issues exist with an individual's salary. Offline increases may also be recommended as a result of a reorganization involving a change in responsibilities.
Probationary Removal	Classified civil service employees are required to serve and successfully complete a probationary period following any initial appointment into a classified civil service position. If an employee's service is found to be unsatisfactory, the employee may be removed from the position at any time during the probationary period. The length of the probationary period is 120 days for classified civil service employees/CWA bargaining- unit employees and one year for Police Officers in the FOP bargaining unit. A probationary classified civil service employee duly removed for unsatisfactory service does not have the right to appeal the removal to the State Personnel Board of Review. A probationary bargaining unit employee is not permitted to appeal the removal decision under the terms of the collective bargaining agreements.

Promotion	The movement of an employee from one position to another budgeted position at a higher classification and pay range; or a higher salary where a pay range does not exist. The former position becomes vacant.
Resignation	A voluntary termination of employment.
Salary Basis Change	A change in appointment status for an employee, 12-month to 9-month or vice-versa.
Status Change	A change in pay group, job family or job function.
Stipend	Contract Professional and non-bargaining unit staff employees may receive a temporary stipend for substantial increases in responsibility for activities outside of the normal scope of the employee's assigned classification (University Rule 3359-11-12.1). Full-time Faculty may receive a stipend for primarily administrative functions requiring substantial increases in responsibility and for activities not included in the ordinary load of teaching, research, and professional service for full- time faculty (University Rule 3359-11-12).
Supplemental	Additional compensation provided for completion of assigned job responsibilities.
Temporary Appointment	An appointment for a limited period of time with a specific beginning and ending date.
Tenure Change	A change to the date for tenure eligibility for a full-time faculty member in a tenure-track position.
Title Change	An employee remains in their budgeted position, but the title changes and there may be an increase in salary. No vacancy is created by the move.
Transfer	Lateral move of an employee from one department to another department, where the employee stays in the same classification.
Training/Apprenticeship	The Collective Bargaining Agreement between the University and the Communication Workers of America contains language in Addendum A that authorizes the Office of Talent Development & Human Resources to develop and administer a Job Enrichment and Apprenticeship Program for CWA bargaining-unit employees. Employees selected to participate in the program are given an opportunity to expand their knowledge and skills. In return, these employees are provided with an increase in pay to reflect the expanded knowledge/skill set that they have developed. All increases in pay are awarded in accordance with approved Wage Progression Schedule.

## Financial Summary For July 1, 2014 through March 31, 2015 (Prepared May 17, 2015)

## UNRESTRICTED CURRENT FUND

## AKRON CAMPUS

## Revenues

• **Tuition and Fees** of \$250 million reflect both fall and spring semesters. This total will not vary much through the last quarter of the fiscal year. The total exceeds budget by \$2.6 million and resulted from actual enrollment (fall and spring), exceeding a projected 4 percent enrollment decline.

Although a positive variance, it represents a 'real dollars' decline from the prior year of approximately \$2.3 million (or 1 percent).

- **State Appropriations** of \$71.2 million tracked slightly ahead of budget, a trend which is expected to continue through the remainder of the fiscal year.
- Other Sources of \$14.9 million lagged projections by \$0.8 million, reflecting both positive and negative variations within this revenue category. The principal fluctuations occurred within *Departmental Sales & Services* and *Earnings on Investments*, which varied from budget by approximately (\$1.7 million) and \$1.1 million, respectively.
- **Distributions from Endowment** of \$187,000 exceeded budget by \$22,000.
- **Overall** total revenues exceeded budget projections by nearly \$1.8 million.

#### **Expenditures by Account Pool**

- Wages and Benefits of \$165.8 million reflected a budget overage of \$5.5 million. This budget variance improved by \$1.7 million to approximately (\$5.5 million) since the February 2015 Board reporting.
- **Non-Personnel** expenditures of \$94.9 million exceeded the annualized budget by nearly \$1 million, reflecting both positive and negative variations within the functions.

Significant fluctuations occurred within *Supplies & Services*, \$6.4 million; *Utilities*, (\$1.8 million); and *Indirect Costs and Overhead*, \$2.1 million. The *Reductions to be Determined* remain and are annualized at \$4.4 million.

Utility costs of \$8.2 million trended higher than expected by \$1.8 million through the first nine months of the fiscal year, which included extreme winter weather. The University negotiated a new electricity contract in late fall, essentially "locking in" much better rates that will be realized over the remainder of the fiscal year.

The *Indirect Costs and Overhead* category reflected an overage of approximately \$2.1 million. The primary source of this "credit" against expenses is overhead assessed to the University's various auxiliary enterprises and Wayne College for centrally incurred costs.

#### **Other Financing Sources (Uses)**

- Other Financing Sources: This category represents the combination of *Transfers (in)* from prior-year balances and *Transfers (out)* primarily made in support of Intercollegiate Athletics, E.J Thomas Hall, and debt payments.
- **Overall** total expenses exceeded budget projections by nearly \$6.5 million.

#### **Overall Summary**

The General Fund's actual revenues exceeded budget by \$1.8 million and actual expenses exceeded budget by \$6.5 million, while the net transfer in/out activity was \$2.5 million less than projected through nine months.

## UNRESTRICTED CURRENT FUND

## WAYNE COLLEGE

#### **Revenues**

- **Tuition and Fees** of \$7.7 million reflect both fall and spring collections. This amount is less than budget by \$0.84 million. The Wayne budget was based on a projected enrollment decline of 4 percent, while the actual enrollment declined approximately 10 percent. The tuition and fees decline as compared to prior year approximates \$1.2 million.
- **State Appropriations** of \$2.9 million tracked with projections, a trend which is expected to continue through the remainder of the fiscal year.
- **Overall** actual revenues reflect a \$0.8 million shortfall through March 31 compared to budget of nearly \$11.4 million.

#### **Expenditures by Account Pool**

- Wages and Benefits of \$5.7 million reflect a positive budget variance of \$1.6 million.
- **Non-Personnel** expenditures of \$1.6 million are running less than budget by nearly \$.8 million.
- **Overall** total expenses were less than budget by approximately \$2.4 million.

#### **Other Financing Sources (Uses)**

The \$83,000 represents funding set aside for various purchase orders initiated in 2014 with payment scheduled in 2015.

#### **Overall Summary**

Wayne College's actual revenues were short of budget by \$.8 million while actual expenses were also short of budget by \$2.4 million. Net transfer in/out activity was minimal at \$83,000.

### **AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES**

Areas of concern at the March close continue to be Intercollegiate Athletics, InfoCision Stadium, and Residence Life and Housing. These three auxiliary operations posted a *combined budget deficit of \$3.8 million*.

Accumulated positive balances at the end of March totaled \$3.6 million. This compares to a balance of \$8.1 million on March 31, 2014.

#### **RESTRICTED CURRENT FUND ACTIVITY**

This report captures all funds received by the University for various restricted purposes (i.e., donors/external agencies) and summarizes the majority of research activity, funds transferred from The University of Akron Foundation, and federal financial aid for qualifying students.

At the end of March, these combined revenue sources totaled \$70.2 million.

## PLANT FUND ACTIVITY

This report "reports" funding sources dedicated to maintaining the University plant (i.e., capital). At the end of March, the balance of these funds totaled \$14.1 million, nearly all of which has been committed for an assortment of projects (see 'Capital Planning and Facilities Management Report' for project details).



### The University of Akron Investment Report For the period July 1, 2014 through March 31, 2015

### SUMMARY

## **Operating Funds**

The Operating Funds posted an overall nine-month rate of return (ROR) of 0.88 percent. Investments yielded income (e.g. dividends) resulting in \$3.3 million for the nine months ended March 31, 2015.

PFM manages the Short- and Intermediate-Term Fixed Income Investments as well as a Cash & Equivalents portfolio. PFM's ROR, net of fees, aggregated 1.11 percent, or \$1.6 million [\$132.9 million average quarterly balance].

The Long-Term investments managed by Legacy achieved a ROR of 0.88 percent; the investments yielded income (e.g. dividends) resulting in \$1.7 million [\$47.8 million average quarterly balance].

The \$3.5 million in realized income exceeded year-to-date budget of \$2.4 million by \$1.1 million.

### Endowments

The Endowments posted a blended ROR of (6.2 percent), or (\$3 million), for the nine months ended March 31, 2015.

The Pooled Endowments managed by Cambridge achieved an overall ROR of (3.3 percent), or (\$3.1 million) [\$59.6 million average quarterly balance], while the blended return of the Separately Invested Endowments posted an overall ROR of (4.5 percent), or \$0.1 million [\$6.9 million average quarterly balance].

Of Cambridge's portfolio, iShares S&P500 ETF achieved the highest nine month ROR at 7.1 percent [\$3.9 million balance at March 31], while the Van Eck Gold Fund achieved the lowest ROR at (34.4 percent) [\$1 million balance at March 31].

The Separately Invested Endowments were invested in accord with donor stipulations. The highest ROR for the nine months ended March 31 was the Oelschlager Leadership Award portfolio, invested at Key Bank, at 5 percent on market value of \$2.2 million at March 31. The lowest ROR for the nine months ended March 31 was the ORSP endowment, invested at PNC, at (0.59 percent) on market value of \$2.6 million at March 31.



Distributions made from the endowments based on spending policy, which is 5% of a 3-year moving average.


#### Administrative Fee

### SUBJECT: Board Items for Approval

The following purchase for more than \$500,000 is recommended for approval by the Board of Trustees at its meeting on June 10, 2015.

**Royall & Company Recruitment Services** - The Department of Enrollment Management proposes an award to Royall & Company for the continuation of services including the development, deployment, management and analysis of a comprehensive communication campaign to recruit future entering classes. The proposed services include:

- targeting recommendations for optimal results (including, as applicable, list recommendations and list order placement);
- strategic program development: messaging, sequencing and interplay between paper and electronic media;
- creative development: copy and design including multiple versions, electronic and paper;
- production of printed materials;
- development and hosting of program response sites;
- exchange of data via secure FTP;
- mailing and mail tracking;
- email deployment and delivery tracking;
- interim and final analyses;
- use of Royall & Company's proprietary methods and systems; and
- access to "My Royall" for real-time reporting and analysis.

In 2014, the University's contract with Royall & Company included building interest in The University of Akron (increasing our prospect pool of high school students); student/senior search and application marketing (increasing our traditional freshman applicant pool); and complementing our traditional freshman confirmation process with the Deposit IQ campaign.

The fall 2014 census application report indicates the following for the traditional, domestic freshman population:

- 41 percent increase in applications (4,872 more applications)
- 32 percent increase in admits (3,032 more admits)
- 5 percent increase in confirmations (220 more confirmed)
- 4 percent increase in enrolled students (138 more enrolled)
- Also notable is an increase in academic quality (grade point average and test score), Honors students and non-residents.

In 2015, the University's contract with Royall & Company included continuing to build interest in UA (increasing our prospect pool of high school students); student search and application marketing (increasing our traditional freshman applicant pool); and complementing our traditional freshman confirmation process with the Deposit IQ campaign. We added the junior search component, we were more aggressive with our senior search, and we added the affordability campaign that focuses on financial aid. The goals included seeking growth in the traditional freshman class and increasing/maintaining its academic quality. Additional goals included building the prospect pool comprised of the junior and sophomore high school classes to seek growth in the 2017 and 2018 freshman classes at UA.

As of May 27, 2015, the application reports indicate the following for the traditional, domestic freshman population compared to this time last year (May 28, 2014):

- 14 percent increase in applications (2,233 more applications)
- 10 percent increase in admits (1,228 more admits)
- 7 percent increase in confirmed (268 more confirmed)
- Also notable is that we've been able to maintain the academic quality and increase the number of Honors students by 8 percent. The number of non-residents who have confirmed their enrollment for the fall 2015 semester has increased to 33 percent (86 students).

As this enrollment cycle continues, the numbers above will change until the census report. However, the positive direction is promising.

This proposed award is acceptable to the Department of Enrollment Management, the Department of Purchasing, and the Office of General Counsel.

I recommend an award be made to Royall & Company in the amount of \$900,000 and request your approval and that of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on June 10, 2015.

The previous contract with Royall & Company was approved by the Board of Trustees in April 2014. The resolution is appended below for reference.









#### Overview

The Division of Student Success (SS) supports the Akron Experience by engaging students in educational, academic support programming and activities to meet the developmental needs of students throughout their college experience. The Division's strategic priorities for FY15 include improving student satisfaction with the Akron Experience, increasing retention and graduation, and developing an effective organizational structure to deliver sustainable results. SS offers a broad range of services, co-curricular activities, programs, and events that are consistent with The University of Akron's strategic priorities. #### **Office of New Student Orientation (NSO)**

#### **Executive Summary**

This report provides an overview of New Student Orientation (NSO) and the three-tiered approach used to help students successfully transition to The University of Akron: 1) Advising & Registration, 2) New Roo Weekend, and 3) Akron Experience: University 101 course. At The University of Akron, New Student Orientation is directed by Associate Director Carly DeBord and reports to Associate Vice President for Student Success Fedearia Nicholson.

Transitioning to a college environment from high school or another life situation can be challenging for many students, so it is crucial that the orientation experience equips students with the tools to ease that anxiety (Chickering & Schlossberg, 1995). Through the summer Advising & Registration program, New Roo Weekend, and the Akron Experience: University 101 course, students receive information needed to be successful at the moment it is needed as opposed to just having one orientation experience. In 2013, New Roo Weekend was added to complement a shortened traditional summer orientation program. In 2014, the Akron Experience: University 101 course was added to address transition issues throughout the first semester. This three-tiered approach provides a comprehensive experience for our incoming freshman class. NSO also works to ensure a successful transition to The University of Akron for the transfer, adult, veteran, and College Credit Plus students through specialized programs tailored to their needs.

NSO provides the following strategic priorities and direction:

- Works toward enrolling learners in degree and certificate programs, and works to improve the year-to-year persistence to graduation through the three-tiered approach
- Works toward academic and inclusive excellence by having diversity in its orientation programming and by ensuring that all programs equip students with the knowledge needed to continue at The University of Akron through graduation
- Recruits a diverse student staff and promotes opportunities to study abroad and explore issues in diversity through New Roo Weekend and the Akron Experience: University 101 courses
- Engages with the campus and community to showcase the campus, programs, and activities to all incoming students and their parents; also partners with the City of Akron for service projects, New Roo Weekend, and the First-Year Lecture

Initial projections for the fall 2015 class are positive. As of April 15, 2015, for all admit types, the applicant pool is up 17 percent, the admit pool is up 12 percent, and the confirmed pool is up 14 percent. With an increase in spring break Advising & Registration programs (four in 2014 vs. five in 2015), the enrolled pool is up 19 percent. Through 27 freshman programs during summer 2015, approximately 4,311 students will participate in NSO with over 100 advisors (contract professionals, faculty members and graduate assistants).


#### **Office of New Student Orientation (NSO)**

#### **New Student Orientation**

The purpose of the Office of New Student Orientation (NSO) is to create programming that assists in developing the Akron Experience for UA students and families. Through orientation programming, NSO seeks to enable students and parents to become more independent, make connections across campus, and begin to feel a part of the UA community. Through additional first-year experience programming, NSO seeks to enhance those connections for students by exposing them to additional experiences on campus allowing for meaningful integration into the campus culture, thereby increasing the retention of those students.

#### **The Three-Tiered Approach**

As students embark on the college journey, there are many factors that can attribute to their success. Students are encountering a major transition in their lives, and according to Dr. Nancy Schlossberg, there are four major factors that determine how a person copes with a transition: situation, self, social, and strategies (Evans, Forney, Guido, Patton, & Renn, 2010). Through Chickering's research, another crucial component to a successful college experience is identity development (Evans et al., 2010). These two theories help shape the orientation experience. Through the summer Advising & Registration program, New Roo Weekend, and the Akron Experience course, issues related to transition and the development of identity are intentionally addressed. All three components work together to create a seamless onboarding experience for the incoming freshman class.



#### 1) New Student Orientation: Advising & Registration Programs

#### Freshman Advising & Registration Programs

Freshmen attend a full-day Advising & Registration program. There is also a Family Focus component to these programs that runs concurrently with the student schedule. NSO hosts 27 freshman programs during the summer, focusing on academic advising, course registration, and timely campus information. The main goals for these programs are for students to: feel like The University of Akron is the right fit for them; be more informed about campus resources; feel more connected to The University of Akron; and be better prepared for college. Many of these programs also include an Honors component (eight programs) and an ADVANCE (multicultural) component (nine programs). To help make these programs a success, over 100 advisors (contract professionals, faculty members, and graduate assistants) assist incoming students. NSO has two contract professionals and one departmental records specialist. Additionally, NSO hires over 30 Orientation Leaders (OLs) who go through a semester-long training program prior to working. OLs range in experiences from freshmen to seniors, students that live on campus or commute, students from a variety of backgrounds, and students involved in a diverse set of campus organizations.

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#### Additional Orientation Programs

Transfer students, College Credit Plus students, adult/veteran students, and students enrolling late in the summer (August) attend half-day programs focused primarily on meeting with academic advisors and registering for classes. Students also see "Your Gold & Blue Preview" to equip them with additional campus information prior to the start of classes. The brevity of the programs allows time for specific needs to be met. There is no Family Focus component to these programs; if parents or guests attend, they are with the student for the duration of the program.

- ADVANCE programs geared toward students of multicultural backgrounds; students attend a one-day program hosted by the Office of Multicultural Development and then attend the traditional Advising & Registration program the following day. Nine ADVANCE programs are hosted during the summer.
- **Transfer Transition programs** geared toward transfer students; students have a one-hour appointment with an academic advisor, time to schedule courses, and academic information presented by the college or advising unit to which the student has been admitted. Ten Transfer Transition programs are hosted during the summer.
- **College Credit Plus programs** geared toward College Credit Plus students; these programs equip students with necessary knowledge about the program, allow them to meet with an academic advisor, and provide time for course registration. Nine College Credit Plus programs are hosted during the summer.
- Adult/Veteran programs day and late-afternoon options are offered for this population. For the day programs, the adult/veteran program runs concurrently with a freshman orientation program. The time dedicated to Academic Information and Advising is covered by UA Adult Focus. Late-afternoon programs (3:30 p.m. 8:00 p.m.) consist of UA Adult Focus information, information about finances or the Military Services Center, meeting with an academic advisor, and class registration. Seven late-afternoon programs are hosted during the summer.
- Late programs (in August) students have a one-hour appointment with an academic advisor, time to schedule courses, and academic information presented by the college or advising unit to which the student has been admitted. Additional time is available to take care of unfinished business before the start of classes. Four late programs are hosted in August.

#### **Satisfaction Information**

Excellent evaluations were received for the 2014 orientation programs. Students and parents were asked to respond on a paper form at the end of the program. The responses are then recorded and analyzed. Initial data from the 2015 programs (spring break only) indicates similar results, if not higher.

- Student Evaluations
  - "I feel like The University of Akron is the right fit for me" 93 percent positive responses (4s and 5s)
  - $\circ$  ~ "I feel more informed about campus resources" 90 percent positive responses
  - "I feel more connected to The University of Akron" 87 percent positive responses
  - "I feel better prepared for college" 86 percent positive responses
  - "I feel like I made at least one friend today" 79 percent positive responses

- Parent Evaluations
  - "I feel like my student will be supported at UA" 95 percent positive responses
  - "I feel like The University of Akron is the right fit for my student" 92 percent positive responses
  - "I feel more informed about campus resources" 91 percent positive responses
  - "I feel supported as the parent of a UA student" 86 percent positive responses
  - "I feel more connect to The University of Akron after attending today's program" 83 percent positive responses

#### New Initiatives for Orientation Programs in 2015

One of the main working goals of NSO has been to create a sustainable model for orientation programming. For many years, the orientation program changed drastically from year to year, making it difficult to collect usable evaluation results. In 2014, NSO began with the basic model that is still being followed to date. Using this basic model for a second year has allowed the department to fix areas that were problematic last year while also finding ways to improve things that were already working.

For 2015, NSO improved on the financial information that is delivered. Last year, students and parents attended a presentation that discussed the FAFSA and paying the bill. The feedback that we received indicated that the information was not timely as many families had already completed the FAFSA, and that it was too technical in showing how to pay the bill. For 2015, the department partnered with an existing presentation from the Office of Multicultural Development that had received excellent feedback in the past, "Getting Real About the Bill". This presentation addressed actual concerns of paying for college instead of the process of making a payment. For some students and parents, though, finances are not a concern, so a Student Success Panel was added as an option for them to attend at the same time. The Panel features stories of UA students that have struggled a little in college and highlights the resources they used to overcome those struggles. Feedback from the 2015 spring break programs indicates that both sessions were very well received.

#### 2) New Roo Weekend

NRW began in 2013 and was developed to fill the gap between the summer orientation program and the start of fall classes. In prior years, the summer orientation day was very long (7:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m.) as it was packed full of all information that students needed prior to starting school. Adding NRW allows for a shortened summer orientation day (8:30 a.m. - 3:45 p.m.) and allows for an opportunity to provide campus information in a timely manner. At NRW, students now find out about campus safety and Title IX, involvement opportunities, and have a chance to network and make friends right before the start of classes. The messages and friendships are more meaningful at this time because their minds are those of college students; in the summer, they often were not ready to receive this information or form those relationships.

First year feedback indicated that NRW was too long and students were burnt out before classes began. A program overhaul was done for 2014 and provided more positive feedback. In the overhaul, Friday was cut down to one-fourth of the day, Saturday was all day, and Sunday remained the same. The schedule has remained relatively the same for 2015 with a few improvements based on student and administrator feedback. The main goals of NRW are for students to: acclimate to campus; form relationships with classmates; understand campus safety issues; discover involvement opportunities; meet current UA students and get advice on the transition to college; and feel a part of The University of Akron. Students are grouped into random "troops" so that they can meet a range of students and not just those in their majors. NRW is planned by a seven-person Operations Team. Major events have a committee of about 20 people from a broad array of departments.

Over 100 volunteers are utilized to staff the weekend and over 150 NRW Leaders are hired to help bring the experience to life. The NRW Leaders represent a wide variety of majors, backgrounds, and experiences on campus. The leaders receive a day and a half of training prior to the weekend.

For 2015, the schedule for NRW is as follows:

- Friday, August 28
  - 5:00 p.m. Campus Cookout Laid back, social event for students outside of InfoCision Stadium; made to feel like game day with music, food, and inflatables; NRW Leaders and others from campus mingle with students.
  - 6:30 p.m. NRW Kickoff Energy-filled event in InfoCision Stadium to start the weekend off on a high note; the UA band performs; the football team runs out onto the field like it's game day; Coach Bowden delivers a brief message to the incoming class.
  - Evening events on campus are promoted.
- Saturday, August 29
  - 9:30 a.m. Troop Meetings Students are assigned to a random "troop" with two leaders; during the meetings, leaders answer questions, share their experiences, and team build with the group.
  - 11:00 a.m. Involvement Breakout Sessions Students can choose from over 15 breakout sessions on topics ranging from study abroad, service-learning, intramural and club sports, and student life (many others are included).
  - 12:00 p.m. **First Year Speaker** Yet to be determined for 2015, the first year speaker should be engaging, energetic, and deliver a positive, uplifting message for students.
  - 12:50 p.m. **Lunch** Boxed lunches are provided for all students.
  - 2:00 p.m. **Campus Safety & Title IX** Students receive crucial campus safety and Title IX information prior to the start of classes.
  - Afternoon and evening events are promoted.
- Sunday, August 30
  - 12:15 p.m. **Troop Meetings** Leaders give final pieces of advice and exchange contact information with students.
  - 1:15 p.m. New Student Convocation Students are inducted as members of the incoming class; historically, this event has included brief speeches from the President of Undergraduate Student Government, the Provost, and the President.
  - 2:00 p.m. **Roo Fest** Almost every student organization is represented at Roo Fest, held in the Student Union; students get a chance to explore them all in one place.
  - 2:00 p.m. Class Schedule Tours Provided by NRW Leaders, students get the chance to walk their class schedules for the fall semester (class schedule tours also are offered on Saturday).

#### New Initiatives for New Roo Weekend in 2015

Just as with the orientation programming, NSO strives to find a sustainable model that would allow for assessment of the program. Based on the feedback received last year from the NRW Leaders, the students, and the administrators that played a part in the weekend, the department determined that overall, the weekend was very successful. Therefore, there have not been major changes for 2015. Listed below are the improvements for this year's NRW:

- Check-In Process has been revamped to include Fast Pass lanes at each gate of the stadium; Zip Card scanners have been purchased for accurate tracking of student attendance.
- Friday Evening Cookout –partnered with Athletics to create a game day feel outside of InfoCision Stadium. Faculty members and campus administrators will be asked to participate at the

cookout to help welcome new students, allowing for a more social feel and beginning the weekend with the right amount of energy.

- Involvement Breakout Sessions –timing of the breakout sessions is being changed to the morning and will hopefully provide for a higher attendance rate than last year. More breakout options are being offered.
- Saturday Speakers there will be two speakers this year, separated by lunch. Students will scan in with Zip Cards to each speaker to allow for an accurate list of attendees.

#### **Satisfaction Information**

Last year, information about students' experiences over NRW was anecdotal and came from our NRW Leaders. For 2015, questions will be included on the MAP-Works survey to allow the department to effectively reach most of the freshman class. Questions will be tailored toward the goals of NRW.

#### 3) The Akron Experience Course: University 101

Effective fall 2014, the 1100:101 course, formerly titled the Student Success Seminar (SSS), became "The Akron Experience: University 101" (AE). First-year seminars are one example of Kuh's High-Impact Educational Practices (2008), which have been shown to be beneficial for student success, so one of the most programmatic changes to the AE course was that it became mandatory for all preparatory and emergent students, and was strongly encouraged for college-ready students. Due to the mandatory requirement, the number of sections increased from 33 in fall 2013 to 76 in fall 2014, a 130 percent increase. To accommodate the increase in sections, college-ready and emergent advisors within the Centers for Academic Advising and Student Success all instruct at least one section, which includes advisees from the respective advising centers. This was an intentional decision to foster the advisor-student relationship that was established during the New Student Orientation: Advising & Registration Program.

From a curricular standpoint, much more of an emphasis was placed on providing a common experience and uniform set of learning outcomes. The learning outcomes expand upon academic information learned at New Student Orientation and the social experiences provided at New Roo Weekend. This first-year seminar course is designed to: orient students to The University of Akron, its traditions and resources; facilitate the development of skills for academic and personal success; and assist in the commitment to an intended major and career pathway. The ultimate goal is to aid students in their first-year transition from high school, and provide learning opportunities that are relevant to what they are experiencing in the first semester. The course incorporated a standardized syllabus and textbook with common assignments and group presentations for key topics. Students also participated in the First-Year Lecture & Common Reading Program.

Preliminary data indicators are positive. The percentage of A's awarded increased from 55.9 percent in fall 2013 to 57.6 percent in fall 2014; this is the highest percentage of A's awarded in the past 5 years. This was an increase of 1.7 percent from fall 2013 to 2014. The percentage of F's awarded decreased from 15.6 percent in fall 2013 to 12.3 percent in fall 2014; this is the lowest percentage of failing grades in the past 5 years. This was a decrease of 3.3 percent from fall 2013 to 2014.

#### Conclusion

NSO strives to provide a comprehensive orientation experience for the incoming freshman class by utilizing the three-tiered method of the summer Advising & Registration Program, New Roo Weekend, and the Akron Experience course. As of now, the Akron Experience course is only required for emergent and preparatory students and strongly encouraged for college-ready students. In the future, it would be beneficial to have a first-year course for all incoming students, even if it is not the same course across the board.

For other student populations, NSO provides the information needed at the time of the orientation and allows additional time during the orientation day for individual needs to be met. These populations (transfer, College Credit Plus, and late orientation students) often have unique needs that are better addressed in a one-on-one environment.

Satisfaction data from the freshman orientation programs is very positive and trending in the same direction for 2015. Data from NRW 2015 will be collected on the MAP-Works survey sent to first-year students during the first semester on campus. Preliminary data indicators for the Akron Experience course also are positive.



Again this academic year, The University of Akron was an honored recipient of the **HEED Award** (Higher Education Excellence in Diversity) given by *Insight Into Diversity* Magazine. This is the third-consecutive year the University has received this award for outstanding commitment to diversity and its integration across the campus community.



As we review 2014-2015, we are poised to continue the drive toward inclusive excellence on The University of Akron's campus.

This year saw the University become a member of **HERC (Higher Education Recruitment Consortium)** to better support faculty and staff diversity. HERC helps its member institutions to recruit and retain the most outstanding and diverse employees and contributes to diversifying the pipeline of faculty, staff, and administrators in academe.



#### **Climate Survey**

In April, a **Diverse Learning Environment Survey** was launched to capture student perceptions regarding the institutional climate; campus practices as experienced with faculty, staff, and peers; and student learning outcomes. The results will be tabulated and presented in early fall.

## **OFFICE OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS - Institute for Teaching and Learning** *Summary of ITL Activities 2014-2015*

#### INTRODUCTION

ITL continued its redesign, in consultation with several advisory groups, to provide a wider range of teaching and career support for faculty and other campus professionals. Our face-to-face programs included orientations, academic leadership development support for chairs and directors, RTP brown bags for tenured and tenure-track faculty, and several year-long series of workshops on career development, student support, and classroom skills—including technology.

ITL piloted several new online initiatives under the broad categories of *Teaching Tools* and *Career Tools* and redesigned its website to make these electronic resources more easily available. Its new *Virtual Library* provides modules in a variety of lengths and formats and now can be accessed on any device, including smartphones and tablets.

*Master Classes and Consultations* were developed through a new partnership model between ITL and other campus offices and academic areas. ITL consulted with campus leaders to identify the best experts from across the country to provide advanced skills development opportunities for faculty and administrators. Topics included advanced STEMM teaching techniques, telling the story of research to increase likelihood of external funding, and retention, completion and assessment strategies. ITL coordinated these events and created online modules from the plenary sessions to support this learning.

Finally, in keeping with a renewed focus on community building, ITL partnered with the Women's Studies Program in the Buchtel College of Arts and Sciences to develop a year-long *Rethinking Gender* series. These faculty presentations, and the cross-disciplinary dialogues they created, were very successful. These community-building efforts will be continued and expanded.

#### SUMMARY OF PROGRAMS

#### **Orientations for New Faculty and Teaching Assistants**

This full-day orientation program was attended by 109 part-time and full-time faculty and 86 teaching assistants. Welcoming remarks by David Giffels, faculty member and nationally recognized author, set a positive tone for the day with his themes of "Loving life in Akron" and embracing "Rust Belt Chic."

#### **Teaching Tools – Face to Face and Online**

Faculty attended in-class workshops and online modules for hands-on assistance and practical guidance on the teaching topics most important to student success. Each week of the academic year there were multiple in-class seminars on topics such as Documenting Student Learning (assessment), Supporting Student Success (using experiential learning, mentors, tutors, advisors and others to provide support and increase student engagement), and the effective use of classroom and other technologies.

#### **Career Tools – Face to Face and Online**

Faculty, staff, contract professionals, and academic administrators attended in-class and online sessions to support their own professional development at every stage of life and career. Topics for tenured and tenure-track faculty members focused on building teaching portfolios and research agendas to support their retention, promotion, and tenure. Topics of general interest for all employees included effective communications, team building and teamwork, stress management, work-life balance, and retirement readiness.

#### **RESOLUTION 6- -15**

#### Continuation of Reduced Non-Ohio Resident Surcharge for Online Students

WHEREAS, The University of Akron's Board of Trustees at its meeting on June 11, 2014 approved resolution 6-10-14 authorizing and requesting the Chancellor's approval of a waiver that reduced the non-Ohio resident surcharge for students enrolled in online courses to \$1 per credit hour; and

WHEREAS, That tuition waiver was approved by the Chancellor to become effective beginning in the 2014 fall semester and continuing through any summer 2015 term that starts prior to June 30, 2015; and

WHEREAS, The University desires to continue to charge the reduced non-Ohio resident surcharge of \$1 per credit hour for students enrolled in online courses with the ongoing goal of expanding online offerings and growing online enrollments in a manner that complements traditional enrollments, thereby increasing positive net revenue; and

WHEREAS, The administration anticipates that the ongoing fee reduction will affect approximately 500 students per year in which the waiver is in effect; and

WHEREAS, §375.30.30 of Am. Sub. H.B. 119 of the 127<sup>th</sup> General Assembly requires any waiver of tuition for a student or class of student not otherwise permitted by law at a state-assisted institution of higher education to be approved by the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents; Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED That the administration of The University of Akron is authorized to continue to offer a reduced non-Ohio resident surcharge for students enrolled in online courses of \$1 per credit hour beginning June 30, 2015 and continuing through any summer 2017 term that starts prior to June 30, 2017; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That the administration will seek prior approval from the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents for the associated fee waiver as required by law.

### **RESOLUTION 6--15**

Revisions to University Rule 3359-11-15

Reemployment procedures for retirees other than retirees who elected to retire under a University of Akron early retirement incentive program for all employees other than bargaining unit faculty

BE IT RESOLVED, that the recommendation presented on June 10, 2015, to revise Rule 3359-11-15 to implement various changes in reemployment for retirees policy and procedure as specified in the attached revised rule, marked as Exhibit 1, be approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President of the University be and hereby is authorized to take such actions as are necessary to align existing reemployment agreements for retirees with the various changes in reemployment for retirees policy and procedure as specified in the attached revised rule, marked as Exhibit 1.

### 3359-11-15 Reemployment procedures for retirees other than retirees who elected to retire under a university of Akron early retirement incentive program for all employees other than bargaining unit faculty.

This rule shall apply to all employees other than members of a bargaining unit in which an agreement governs the reemployment of retirees.

- (A) Am. Sub. Senate Bill 144, effective September 14, 2000, and other relevant sections of the Revised Code facilitate the reemployment of qualified STRS Ohio benefit recipients by removing past restrictions on this process. These changes to Ohio law permit qualified retirees from the university of Akron the opportunity to retire and begin receiving their personal annuity benefits and be reemployed full-time with the university of Akron at no additional cost to the university of Akron.
- (B) Full-time university of Akron employees other than members of a bargaining unit who are eligible to retire from an Ohio pension system affected by the enactment of Am. Sub. Senate Bill 144 may seek an agreement with the university of Akron, in advance of retirement, to be reemployed full- or part-time with the university of Akron as permitted by law in the same or similar position following retirement, without the necessity of a formal search process under the university's affirmative action plan. All such agreements shall be reduced to writing and shall be subject to prior approval by the board of trustees. This rule shall not be deemed to obligate the board to approve any such agreement or to create any right to such reemployment or expectancy of reemployment or expectancy of any right to reemployment for any employee or retiree of the university of Akron.
- (C) Such reemployment agreements, in the case of tenured or tenure-track faculty, shall expressly provide that tenure and any right or expectancy to obtain tenure shall terminate upon the employee's retirement; and any such reemployment with the university of Akron thereafter shall not include any grant of tenure or any expectancy or other entitlement whatsoever to obtain tenure as a result of reemployment or otherwise. Any period of reemployment shall not count or in any way be used to count toward the obtainment of tenure at the university of Akron. The reemployed retiree shall be entitled to retain the appropriate academic rank achieved upon retirement.
- (D) Unless otherwise approved by the board of trustees, such reemployment agreements shall include the following in addition to any other specific provisions that may be included in any agreement:
  - The term of any reemployment agreement.<u>A non-renewable term of one year</u>, except that the board of trustees, on the recommendation of the president and

provost, may renew for successive one year terms reemployment agreements for faculty whose peer-reviewed research and scholarship is recognized nationally and internally to be preeminent, has a history of service to the university, and from whose presence on the faculty the university derives an immeasurable benefit.

- (2) The employee shall be eligible to enroll in the university's group health insurance and other benefits programs in the same manner as all other similarly situated university of Akron employees.
- (3) Reemployment agreements entered into after January 1, 2012, shall provide that eighty percent (80%) of the greater of (a) the retiree's annual base salary at retirement or (b) the retiree's annual base salary at June 30, 2015 shall be the maximum amount of retiree's base salary upon reemployment, prorated for any reemployment period. If the retiree is reemployed on a part-time basis, the retiree's maximum salary will be eighty percent (80%) of the greater of (a) the retiree's prorated annual base salary at retirement or (b) the retiree's prorated annual base salary at June 30, 2015. Retirees who have been reemployed prior to January 1, 2012, shall not be eligible for any increase in annual base salary after January 1, 2012.
- (4) Nothing in this rule shall preclude the president of the university from recommending a reemployed retiree receive:
  - (a) A stipend for additional duties or responsibilities;
  - (b) A bonus, or other such award for merit; or
  - (c) Any other amount based on employee performance.

However, such additional amounts, if approved by the board of trustees, shall not be considered or made a part of the reemployed retiree's base salary.

- (E) These procedures shall not be available to employees or former employees of the university of Akron who elected to retire from the university of Akron through participation in an early retirement incentive program (ERIP).
  - (1) Definitions.
    - (a) "Superannuate" means a former teacher receiving a service retirement allowance under section 3307.58 or 3307.59 of the Revised Code from the state teachers retirement system (STRS) or a combined service retirement benefit paid in accordance with section 3307.57 of the Revised Code, regardless of which retirement system is paying the benefit.

- (b) "Other system retirant" means a member or former member of the public employees retirement system (PERS), police and firemen's disability and pension fund, school employees retirement system (SERS), state highway patrol system, or Cincinnati retirement system who is receiving age and service or commuted age and service retirement, or a disability benefit from a system of which he is a member or former member.
- (2) State teachers retirement system (STRS).
  - (a) The university of Akron may employ a superannuate or other system retirant as a teacher. (R.C. 3307.35(B)).
  - (b) Any superannuate or other system retirant employed as a teacher at the university of Akron shall contribute to the state teachers retirement system. (R.C. 3307.35(C)).

Any superannuate or other system retirant who has received retirant benefits for less than two months shall forfeit the allowance or benefit for any month the superannuate or retirant is employed prior to the expiration of such period. (R.C. 3307.35(F)).

- (3) School employees retirement system (SERS).
  - (a) A public employer may employ a SERS retirant or other system retirant and, if so employed, the retirant must contribute to SERS. (R.C. 3309.341(B)(1)).
  - (b) A SERS retirant or other system retirant who has received his or her retirement allowance or disability benefit for less than two months when reemployment begins will forfeit his or her retirement allowance or disability benefit for the period that begins on the date the employment commences and ends on the date that is two months after the date on which the retirement allowance or disability commenced. (R.C. 3309.341(C)).
- (4) Public employees retirement system (PERS).
  - (a) A PERS retirant who has received a retirement allowance for less than two months when employment begins will forfeit the allowance for the period that begins on the date the employment begins and ends on the date that is two months after that date on which the retirement allowance began. (R.C. 145.38(B)(4)).
  - (b) A PERS retirant who enters into a contract to provide services as an independent contractor to the employer by which the retirant was employed at the time of retirement or, less than two months after the

retirement allowance commences, begins providing services as an independent contractor pursuant to a contract with another public employer, will forfeit the pension portion of the retirement benefit for the period beginning the first day of the month following the month in which the service begin and ending on the first day of the month following the month in which the services end R.C. 145.38(B)(6).
