Fun fact: "The Akron Sound," a term journalists and music historians have applied to the punk/new wave uprising Devo spearheaded in the late 1970s, translates to "il suono di Akron," which, like everything in Italian, sounds delicious.

Philathia Bolton

After over a decade of teaching, research, and service at The University of Akron, Dr. Philathia Bolton has accepted a position to teach at The Africa Institute, Global Studies University. She will be joining them this fall as Associate Professor of African and African Diaspora Literature and Cultural Studies. Dr. Bolton joined the English department at The University of Akron in 2013 as an Assistant Professor. While here, she has served in the roles of academic advisor for a number of student organizations, as the Honors College advisor for English students, and has contributed to various advisory committees and boards. Many of our students have enjoyed taking courses with her at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, namely the survey in Black American Literature, the Harlem Renaissance seminar, and the Toni Morrison seminar. We are excited for Dr. Bolton, but we are also sad to see her go. We thank her for her contributions over the years and wish her the very best on her next position.



Alan Ambrisco

Alan Ambrisco has two poems coming out in the 2025 edition of a new literary journal with local ties called *Verdant Wonders*. 

The Girl With the Black Lipstick by Mary Biddinger

Mary Biddinger's novella *The Girl with the Black Lipstick* will be released by Black Lawrence Press in July.


"Mary Biddinger's *The Girl with the Black Lipstick* isn't simply a blast from the past—it is the past—the year 1999 brought back to life in all its Twitter-less, text-less glory, courtesy of the narrator Mary Van Pelt, who blends nostalgia and cynicism in appropriate doses. A graduate student of English, Mary—along with her unnamed and exotic 'Roommate'—explores the bars and streets and beaches of Chicago in between enduring the frequent absurdities of a grad school creative writing workshop. As in much of Biddinger's work, the narrative is never linear, a straight-line journey from A to B along bland interstates, but feels instead like an excursion along the backroads of life where all the good scenery is, served up throughout this book in stunningly original images and observations. This is a story that feels perfectly suited to the novella-in-flash, a reach back to grab the fragments of who we were in the final year of the twentieth century, to hold them to the light in an attempt to understand what peculiar threads connected us."

Akron at 200: A Bicentennial History co-edited by Jon Miller

Akron at 200: A Bicentennial History will be published this summer by The University of Akron Press. It's edited by Jon Miller and David Lieberth. It's part of the City of Akron's Bicentennial Celebration. (The city was founded on December 6, 1825.)

It includes chapters by Jon Miller (on Akron in the 1830s), Philathia Bolton (on Sojourner Truth), David Giffels (on "the Akron Sound"), and UA English alum Christi Blythin (on the lives of Akron's domestic servants). It will be about 450 pages, hardcover, and \$50. The book should be ready to purchase before July 4th.



Student Spotlight

with Chloe DiMario



As NEOMFA student Chloe DiMario says, "Every UnClass leaves you with questions." The Fall 2024 "Out of the Archives: Exploring Akron's LGBTQ+ History" UnClass was no different, but this time Chloe, along with course instructors Professor Hillary Nunn and Tony Pankuch, Education and Outreach Coordinator at the Cummings Center for the History of Psychology, will have the chance to pursue those questions further, thanks to a \$10,000 grant from the Akron Gay Community Endowment Fund. The funds will help create the Akron LGBTQ+ Archive, an online collection of local oral histories and documents.

Chloe will be working to collect and organize these materials, many of which are connected to the University of Akron Archives and Special Collections' holdings. As Chloe says, students in the UnClass "found multiple stories to share that clearly showed a rich history somewhat tucked away in Akron's past, but more than that we found a lack of representation. We explored local churches, The University of Akron, transgender identities and more and yet this only furthered our desire to learn about other identities."


As Chloe puts it, "This UnClass showed us that Akron's LGBTQIA+ history is an iceberg that reaches a lot farther down than we originally expected and by now, we've barely dived past the surface." And starting this summer, Chloe will have the chance to dive in further.

In March 2025, Olivia Kurylo and Dr. Hillary Nunn gave an exciting joint presentation to an engaged audience of English Department students and faculty. The presentation was entitled "Staging Shakespeare, Staging Insanity: Nineteenth-Century Popular Images of Asylum Thespians," and it grew out of the pair's work with the Archives of the History of American Psychology, housed in UA's own Cummings Center for the History of Psychology.

In her portion of the presentation, Dr. Nunn made some introductory remarks about the Cummings Center and the challenges and opportunities for research in its archives. Nunn, who was recently recognized by The EX[L] Center for Community-Engaged Teaching methods, has been affiliated with the Center on various projects, and she regularly steers her students to its archives in several of her classes, including both Unclasses and regular offerings.

Olivia Kurylo's portion of the presentation focused on her original research at the CCHP archives. Using an engaging slideshow, she presented historical images of asylum patients portraying Shakespearean characters on stage, a practice that was surprisingly in vogue in the nineteenth century. Olivia discussed both how the cultural impact of Shakespeare helped shape the ways doctors were treating their patients and how patients subsequently internalized these norms in performance of the Bard's plays.

Olivia's presentation was drawn from her senior honors thesis, part of the requirements for her graduating with her B.A. degree this spring. But Olivia is not done with us yet. She's part of the English Department's new Five-Year Accelerated Degree Pathway (ADP) Program, meaning next year she'll complete her M.A. in English as well, cutting the time required to earn both degrees from six to five.
