We are Scholars

We take scholarship seriously; our members are students first. In fact, retention and graduation rates of fraternity and sorority members are higher than non-affiliated students.

The first fraternity was founded by a group of men who came together to discuss and debate literary topics and politics. Fraternities and sororities today still hold academic achievement to a high regard, and each chapter has unique ways of promoting academic excellence. Most chapters have membership GPA standards, academic programs or banquets that support and recognize members’ academic achievement, and detailed plans to provide assistance for and attention to those who may have a rough semester or two. Many of the academic support programs include tutoring, mentoring from members with a similar major, grade brag boards, study skills seminars and more.

The fraternity & sorority community has achieved at least a 3.0 average GPA for the past year, which was above the all-undergraduate average. Our fraternities perform above the all-men’s undergraduate average GPA, mirrored by the sororities who also perform above the all-women’s undergraduate average GPA. The community strives to consistently increase their average GPA each semester.

Each year at the annual Greek Leadership Awards, awards are given to recognize chapters for outstanding academic excellence, new member academic excellence, most improved GPA, scholastic achievement and academic programming.

Students who consistently earn exemplary grades have the opportunity to apply to be a member of Order of Omega, Gamma Sigma Alpha, and Rho Lambda Honor Societies. These groups recognize the top 3% of our community membership, all of which display elite academic performance.

We are Leaders

Fraternity men and Sorority women gain leadership ability through executive board and committee memberships on their governing council boards and within their respective chapters. The Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life staff facilitates the development of leadership and all that comes along with it. The peer leadership approach prepares students for life after graduation. Many times, fraternities and sororities collaborate with one another on events, socials and awareness campaigns; the councils work together to lead the community as a whole.

Individual inter/national organizations host a wide variety of leadership conferences for their members. In addition, the three governing councils at UA attend the Association for Fraternal Leadership and Values Central Leadership Conference each year, where all three have been awarded the highest honors.

We are Civic Citizens

Our chapters are dedicated to serving the community and to philanthropic organizations close to their hearts. In the 2016-2017 academic year, the community completed 16,645 hours of community service for over 250 different organizations. Additionally, the community raised \$69,665 for the academic year. The 84th annual Songfest- a singing, dancing, and philanthropy competition- raised \$4,760 for Camp Quality- Ohio.

For the fifth consecutive year the FSL Alternative Spring Break Trip, benefiting Camp Twin Lakes in Winder, Georgia, was offered. 41 students from nine different chapters participated in Alternative Spring Break.

Each year chapters are recognized at the Greek Leadership Awards for their commitment to service and philanthropy.

Through common membership, interests and most of all, values, our chapters are brought together in unity and support one another. The Greek Leadership Awards and intramurals create a friendly competition. This competition between chapters is one that ultimately challenges organizations to grow. The Annual Greek Week competition assigns random chapters to form a team together and new relationships are formed; philanthropy events done together hold a special place in the hearts of our members; doing service work and being a part of the governing councils creates bonds that are unbreakable. Songfest 2016

The fraternity and sorority community participated in the 84th Songfest, "A night on Broadway" on Sunday, April 23 at EJ Thomas Hall. This year 12 chapters that participated with 215 students performing. The award winners were: 1st Place Sorority went to Alpha Delta Pi performing Hairspray, Phi Delta Theta performing Annie was the 1st Place Fraternity and the 1st Place Combined Act went to our two newest organizations on campus Delta Zeta and Phi Kappa Psi performing Aladdin. 702 people attending Songfest, which included President Wilson, Dr. Messina, UA Alumni, and Camp Quality families. The FSL Community raised \$4,760 for Camp Quality taking our five-year donation total to over \$36,000. Camp Quality of Ohio provides a week-long camping experience and year-round support system for children with cancer and their families. Each child is assigned a companion who provides support and encouragement during the week. They spend twenty-four hours a day together which usually results in friendships that last long after camp has ended. Camp Quality is a volunteer, non-profit organization.



There is never a cost to our campers or their families. They depend totally on the generosity of individuals, business organizations and foundations acting out of concern for these children. We are so proud of all the members of our community who participated, worked behind the scenes and came to support the event in order to raise so much for Camp Quality!



Alternative Spring Break 2016

Camp Twin Lakes, GA

This March, 41 members of the Fraternity and Sorority Life community traveled to Winder, Georgia for a service-oriented spring break trip at Camp Twin Lakes. This is the fifth consecutive year that the community has organized an Alternative Spring Break trip to the camp, which provides a life-changing camp experience to children with illnesses and disabilities that would normally prevent them from attending summer camp.

Volunteers represented nine different Greek organizations helped the camp with a variety of tasks, including: sodding a field, mulching, reupholstering chairs, and planting trees. These students volunteered 984 hours of time over their spring break. This time and effort allowed 29 campers to attend Camp Twin Lakes free of charge.

The students volunteering also enjoyed an opportunity to grow closer with other members of the community. They spent evenings playing cards and sports, making s'mores, tie-dyeing shirts, and completing team building exercises. Participants enjoyed a wonderful and productive spring break experience, and the camp and campers benefited tremendously.



Greek Leadership Awards

The Greek Leadership Awards is an annual celebration banquet where fraternities and sororities at the University of Akron are recognized for their achievement and improvement from the previous year. Chapters submit and present to judges in categories such as member development, new member programming, scholarship improvements, innovative philanthropy events, and much more. This event restores the sense of community by recognizing all of the great accomplishments in Fraternity and Sorority Life. It highlights the purpose of fraternity and sorority membership through rewarding those who embody our values, raise our standards, and inspire our members.

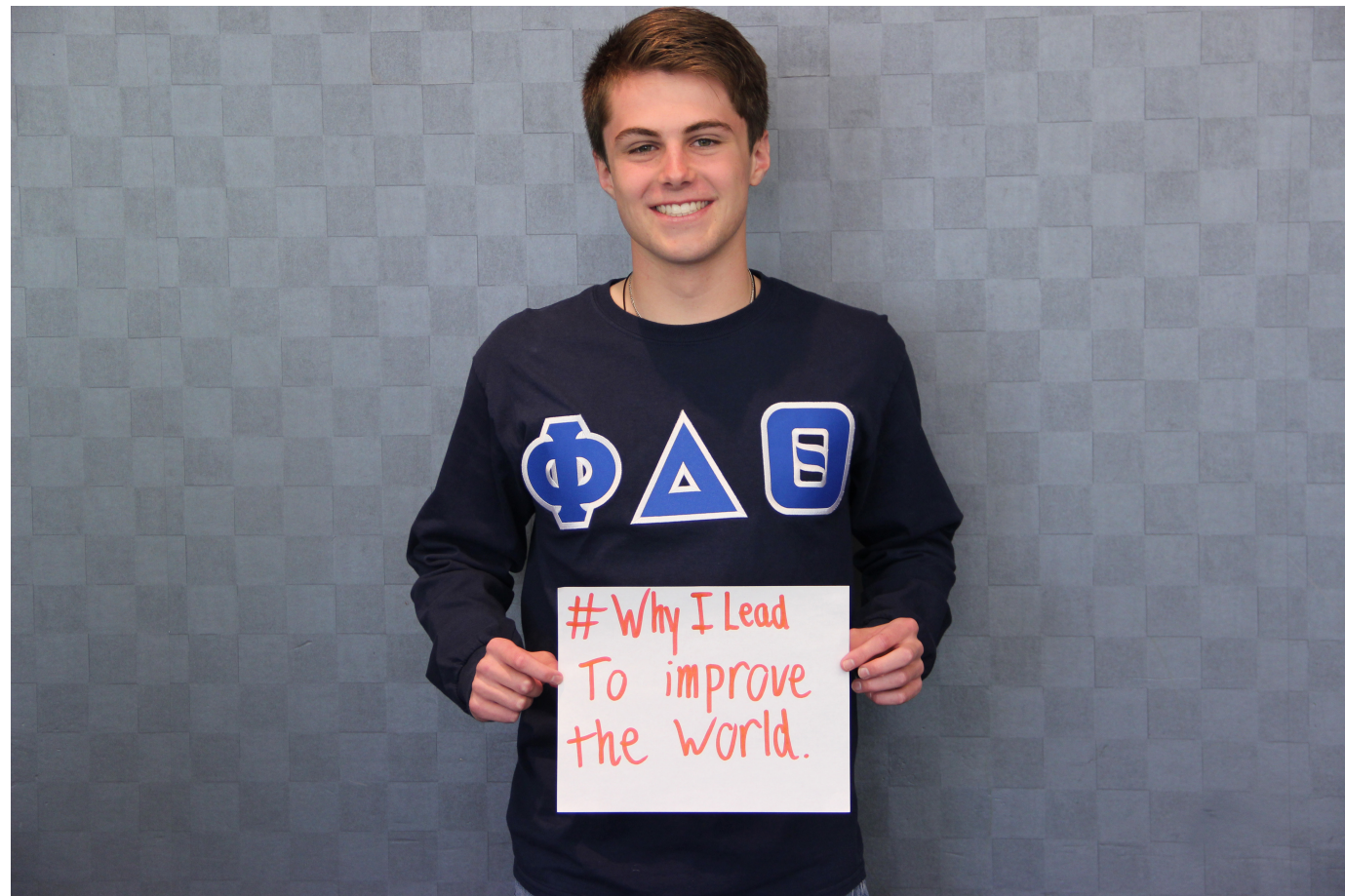

While it was still winter, our members and the men of Alpha Sigma Phi had an ice skating social at Lock 3 in Akron. We also had the men of Sigma Nu over to our house to take part in a murder mystery social. Lastly, we got to know the women of Akron's newest sorority, Delta Zeta, when we had a sisterhood social playing minute-to-win-it games.

This semester, Alpha Delta Pi stayed actively involved in the Greek community and on campus. To transition into our new philanthropy, we participated in a multitude of service events dealing with hunger in our community. Our members volunteered with Bridging the Gap Ministries and the Akron-Canton Food Bank. Additionally, this semester, we implemented our new officer structure. This has been an adjustment, but we are so honored to have been chosen as one of only sixteen Alpha Gamma Delta chapters to pilot the new structure. The various changes that have occurred this semester have truly allowed us to grow as a chapter.

The success of the Omega chapter of Alpha Gamma Delta was recognized at this year's Greek Leadership Awards. Along with winning second place, we also were recognized for having the best banner and costumes, as well as the most alumni in attendance. 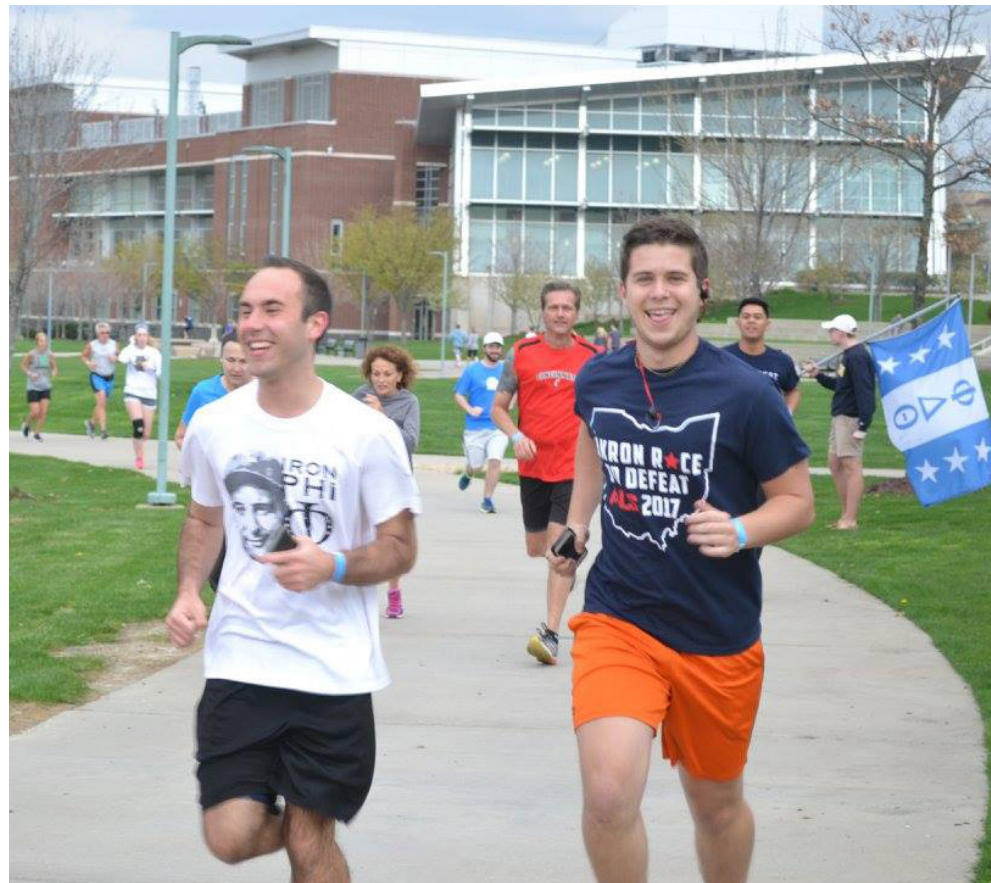

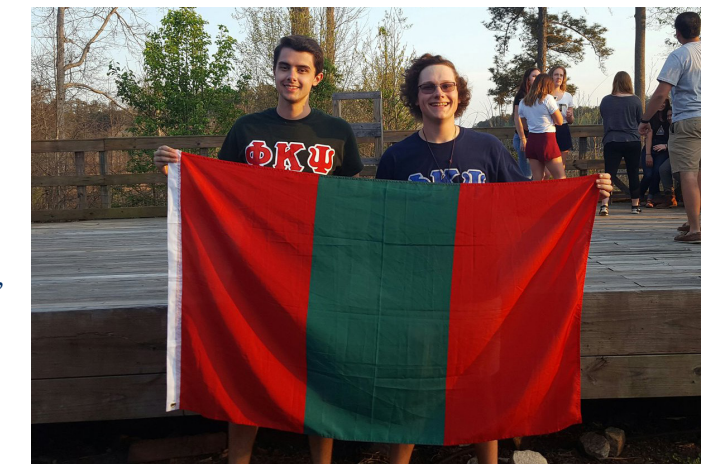

Interfraternity Council

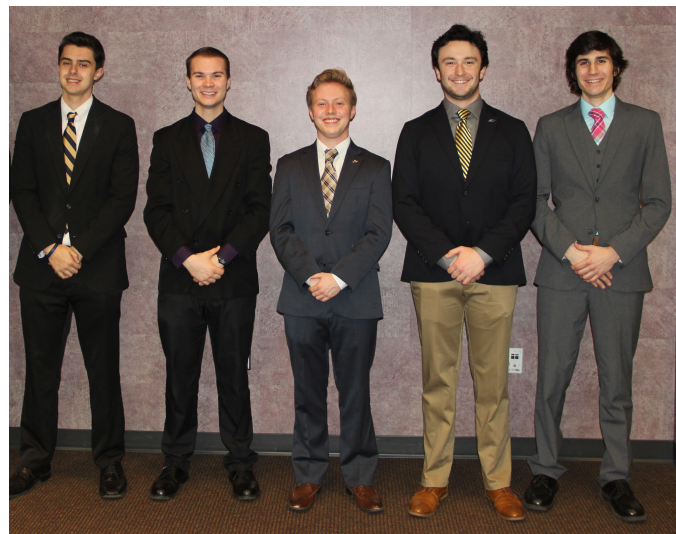


Coming into the new year, the Interfraternity Council looked to make continuing progress on their mission to perpetuate fraternity life throughout The University of Akron community. With the onboarding of new officers, the 2017 Interfraternity Council Executive Board was eager to get to work alongside their community. Starting to foster community and connections through leadership retreats with the purpose of educating both our council and chapter leaders on issues relevant to their terms in office. Along with the training our community received, four of our Interfraternity Council officers had the privilege to attend the Association for Fraternal Leadership and Values (AFLV) Conference in Indianapolis, Indiana. During this conference, they were trained on topics specific both to their respective positions and fraternity life. Between both the fraternity and sorority community, a total of 4,760 was raised for Camp Quality, a year-round camp that supports children who are struggling with the battle with cancer. Throughout the spring semester, it is evident the impact that our fraternity community made onto the organizations that they care about.

As we look to enter the fall semester, we look forward to welcoming all the Zips, new and old, to The University of Akron, and we hope that they may join us in our mission to continue the thriving tradition that is fraternity life at The University of Akron!

Helping your student “go Greek”

How You Can Support Your Student

The University of Akron is home to 20 fraternities and sororities. Naturally, it can be a little overwhelming to students upon their first few weeks on campus to decide which chapter is right for them. As a parent, you should know that fraternity and sorority membership offers a familial support system away from home that enables academic achievement, a culture dedicated to being responsible citizens, leadership opportunities and training, and a community of peers going through similar experiences.

Upperclassmen in fraternities and sororities can offer advice on their experiences at The University of Akron—whether that be advice for in the classroom or study tips, each chapter has a vast network of majors and offer invaluable advice on “learning the ropes” and adjusting to being a college student.

In addition to the active members fraternities/sororities offer huge networks of alumni across the globe to mentor undergraduates on smart career moves and provide guidance on life skills needed in “the real world”. Many Senators, Chief Justices, Presidents, CEOs, entrepreneurs, philanthropists, and many of you are members of fraternities and sororities.

If your student is considering “going Greek”, remember to keep an open mind about your son or daughter’s interest as the media can be misleading and your experience will be drastically different than theirs. Many movies or popular internet trends are not a true representation of the genuine purpose and values members live up to each day. Chapters are led by students but most have (inter)national organizations of alumni and experts advising the function and values-based decision making of the chapter. Each is required to have a chapter advisor that regularly attends meetings and helps interpret the (inter)national constitution, values, and rituals of the group.

Be a Support System:

There are many ways to support your student during exciting time, as a life-long decision of membership should not be taken lightly. Encourage your student to be confident and show their genuine self.

- Check in with your student during the recruitment process
- Talk with your student about making an individual decision: friends amongst chapters are a good thing!
- Help them weigh the considerations for joining each group: philanthropy, sisterhood/brotherhood support, service work, scholarship opportunities, leadership development academies, responsibilities, financial and job skills.
- Talk about the financial responsibility associated with membership.
- If you are an alumnus/a of an organization, consider their legacy but also be open-minded and supportive of membership should they choose a fraternity/sorority other than your own.

Get Involved!

As a parent of a fraternity man or sorority woman there are many ways you can be involved. Should your student join, be sure to participate and witness their growth firsthand.

- Ask about their new sisterhood or brotherhood.
- Be supportive of your student’s path of choice to join.
- Research the chapter through visiting their (inter)national website!
- Ask about the values and historical pillars of membership
- Know the contact information for the organization’s headquarters, chapter advisor and Fraternity & Sorority Life Office.
- Attend family days and events! Meet other members of the chapter.
- Encourage your student to take advantage of local, state, regional, national or international resources, including scholarships.
- Encourage your student to take a leadership role in the chapter.
- Know the grade requirements and challenge them to exceed it!

Let’s talk finances

How will your child pay for this? What does the money go towards? Most of our chapters offer payment plans so that the cost is more manageable throughout the year. Some organizations offer reduction for paid-in-full dues as well. The great thing about fraternity and sorority life is that in addition to recognizing the academic priority they also recognize that many students need to work in order to pay for college and their membership. The culture of working students is common amongst the community membership.

Dues amounts vary by chapter. Most commonly dues go to the inter/national headquarters for insurance, initiation/membership processing fee, and foundation dues. Many of these inter/national dollars come back to the student through education activities, scholarship opportunities, and development opportunities. Chapter dues typically go towards a variety of things, which may include a membership pin, housing fees, council dues, costs for chapter events like formals or brotherhood and sisterhood events. Many chapters also keep a savings account, provide scholarships for grades, and cover registrations and lodging for regional leadership conferences. If you or your student has questions, encourage them to ask what their money is going towards; our chapters are expecting questions and are transparent on what the funds are used for.

Know their Limits:

Your son or daughter is a student first. Fraternities and sororities all value scholastic achievement and are indeed founded on an academic standard. Membership in a fraternity or sorority should never hinder your student’s grades: chapters have academic plans that enable environments of good study habits and have a “grades first” approach. Check in with your student on how they are adjusting to college and how their new sisters and brothers are supporting their dreams.

Finally, at any point through the recruitment process or your son or daughter’s membership please feel free to reach out to the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life. We are here to answer questions for you, provide connections to resources and support your son and daughter.

On behalf of the office, we hope that your son or daughter has the opportunity to experience the true meaning of brotherhood and sisterhood during their collegiate years. This University of Akron’s Fraternity and Sorority Community is made up of wonderful chapters that provide students with a wealth of opportunities and experiences. We hope that you will encourage and support your student in exploring what our great community has to offer.

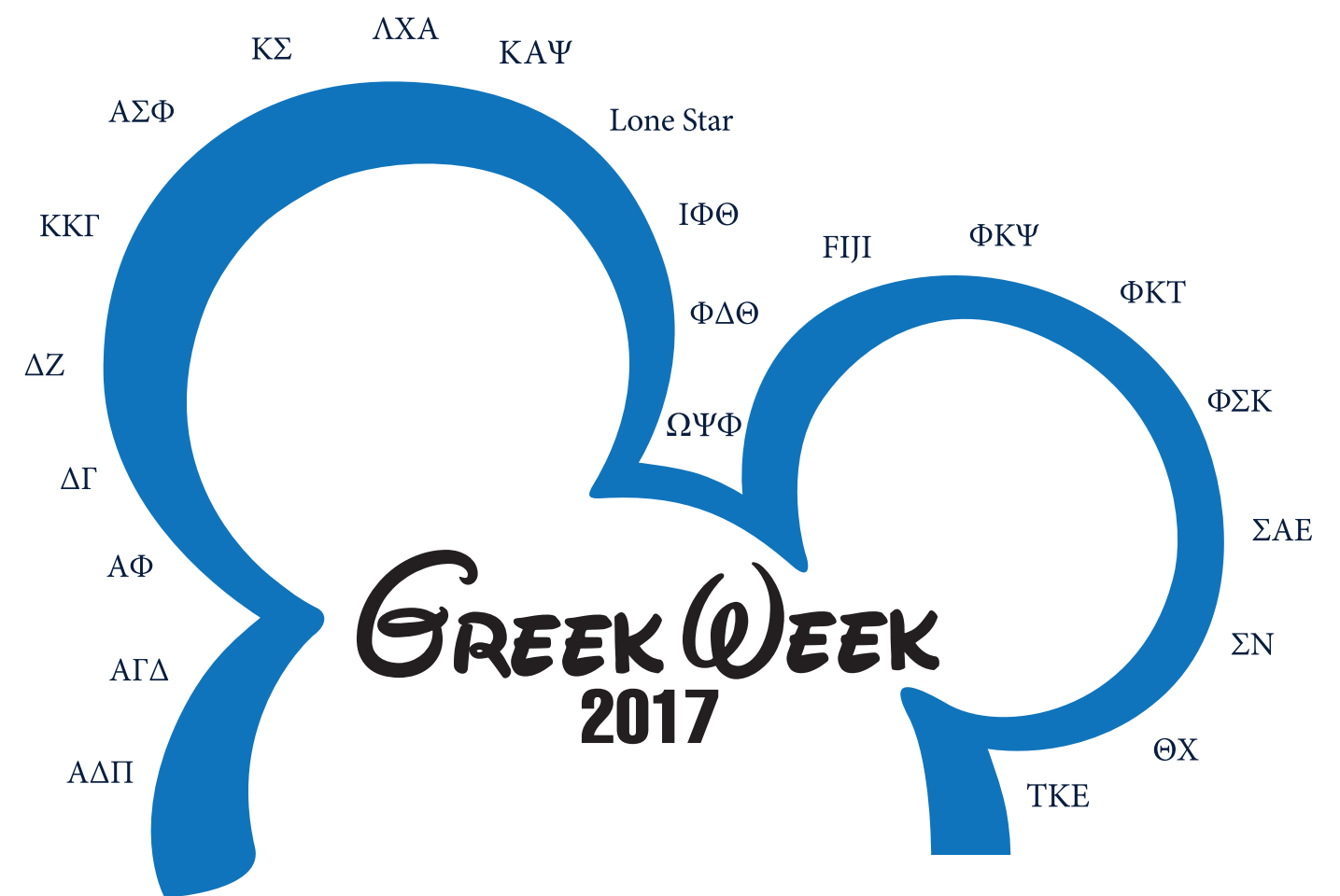
